Gareth Hall, Director General of the Department for the Economy & Transport, Welsh Assembly Government

Gareth Hall was appointed Director General of the new combined Department for the Economy & Transport when the Welsh Development Agency (WDA) and Wales Tourist Board merged with the Welsh Assembly Government. Prior to taking up this new position which covers Economic Development, Transport and European funding, with an annual budget of approximately £1.5bn, he had held the post of Chief Executive of the WDA since 2004. Gareth is the Wales representative on the Nations and Regions group of the Organising Committee for the London Olympic Games, 2012.



Byron Davies, Chief Executive, Cardiff Council

For two decades, Byron Davies has been at the heart of the regeneration and transformation of the Capital City of Wales. Byron has contributed to the professional development of public services as a long serving Chief Executive and as President of the Society of Local Authority Chief Executives (SOLACE UK). Byron is the Vice-President of UDITE, the pan-European Chief Executive professional body. He represented UDITE as an observer at the Council of Europe.



Shunsuke Mutai, Director, Japan Local Government Centre

Shunsuke Mutai joined the Japan Local Government Centre in July 2007 from the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications. His career has been varied with posts in several local governments and the ministry. His work included time in the decentralisation reform of local taxation and fiscal systems, the crisis management and community policies, and as a liaison for the Diet. His interests include the working of the EU on a global level, but also how each area maintains, preserves and promotes its individual identity.



Conrad McDonogh, Director Home Appliance Division, Panasonic Manufacturing UK Ltd.

Conrad McDonogh joined Panasonic in 1991 and was appointed to the Board in April 2007. For many years was in charge of the company's sales to DEM customers, his responsibilities now include Planning and H.R. functions. He has previously worked in a variety of marketing roles within the automotive and materials bandling industries.



Dave Gilbert, Deputy Chief Executive, Carmarthenshire County Council on behalf of the Welsh Local Government Association (WLGA)

Dave Gilbert became Head of Economic Development for Neath Port Talbot County Borough Council in 1996 and took up his present job as Director of Regeneration for Carmarthenshire in January 2003, and in 2005 he was appointed Deputy Chief Executive. In 2002 and 2003, he was President of the West Wales Chamber of Commerce, the first public sector President in its history and is still a Board Member. He is also a board member of Chamber Wales. He is an Economic Development Advisor to the Welsh Local Government Association.



Dr. Naofumi Nakamura, Associate Professor, Institute of Social Science, University of Tokyo Dr. Naofumi Nakamura now holds the post of Visiting Senior Fellow at the London School of Economics and Political Science. His major is Business and Economic History, specifically Japanese Railway History and Comparative Regional History. In 1997, he completed his PhD at Kyushu University's Graduate School of Literature (History Department). In 2006, he conducted the Hope Studies Kamaishi Research, a major general regional research project carried out by the Institute of Social Science at the University of Tokyo.
