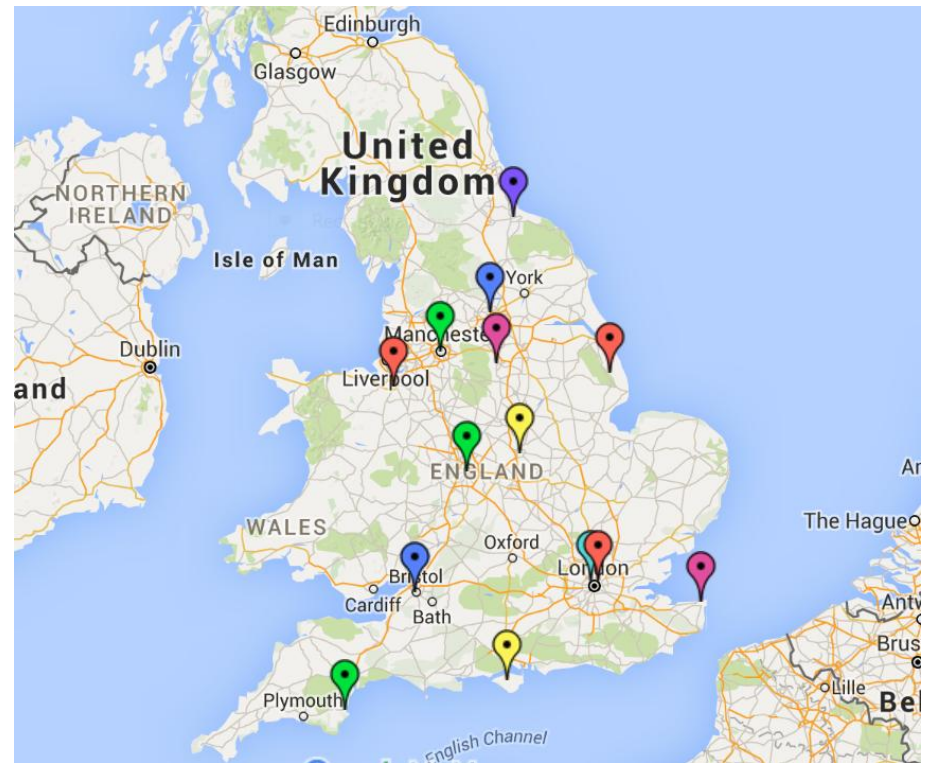

Share learning and spread best practice across England

The Greater Manchester (GM) Ageing Hub has been created so that GM partners can coordinate a strategic response to the opportunities and challenges of an ageing population. It will:

- ensure ageing is appropriately reflected across all appropriate GM implementation plans by using a place-based approach
- develop an evidence base by testing new and innovative solutions to the challenges and opportunities associated with ageing populations
- help bring together existing activities and structures and work collaboratively to design and develop thinking, new ideas and interventions, developing economic opportunities and enabling people to live longer, happier and healthier lives.
- lead strategy development for GM, and will inform, shape and develop wider national strategy as appropriate.
- promote a positive discourse on ageing, changing the rhetoric of an ageing demographic
- lead national thinking, through the delivery of research excellence, and will expand the use of evidence in policy making in this field.

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The UK Network was launched in September 2012 when cities from across the UK committed to work together to share learning around Age-friendly cities. The network has involved: Manchester, Leeds, Bristol, Cardiff, Nottingham, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Brighton, Isle of Wight, Stoke, Sheffield, Belfast and Camden.

The aims of the network include to:

- share learning through peer support, enquiry visits and policy seminars
- develop evidence on what works in approaches to age friendly cities and communities
- create a national collaborative voice to influence policy and practice on age-friendly city work
- promote the Age-friendly approach to a wide range of stakeholders beyond local authorities, such as other public bodies, private and third sector organisations.
- work with the World Health Organisation (WHO) Global Network of Age-friendly Cities and Communities
- develop the infrastructure, expertise and capacity at a national, regional and local level to support age friendly approaches.
