


Thomas Blake Glover ('the Scottish Samurai')

- Born Fraserburgh 1838
- Family moved to Aberdeen 1844
- Arrived Nagasaki via Shanghai 1859
- Merchant for ships, guns and gunpowder
- Introduced railways, shipbuilding and coal mining to Japan
- Political involvement through Chōshū Five and Satsuma Fifteen
- Toppling Tokugawa Shogunate
- Cordial relationships with Meiji government
- Mitsubishi link through shipbuilding activity
- Died in Tokyo 13 December 1911




Glover (r) with Iwasaki Yanosuke, son of founder of Mitsubishi, c 1900

The Glover House (*Ipponmatsu*, *Single Pine Tree*) in グラバー園, Gurabāen (Glover Garden, Nagasaki)





- Visit to Nagasaki by former Lord Provost of Aberdeen

- North east Scotland
- 7 hours by train from London
- 100 minutes by plane
- Former centre of shipbuilding
- Coastal setting of great beauty
- Now 'energy capital of Europe'
- Outward looking for trade for hundreds of years

- Kyūshū Island
- 7 hours from Tokyo by train
- 120 minutes by air
- Harbour city shipbuilding
- Fjord-like setting
- An 'atypical' Japanese city
- One of the few 'trading centres' during Japan's closed period





Coming up to date

 Citizens' Friendship Agreement signed in Aberdeen – July 2010



- Confirmation of Citizens' Friendship City Affiliation between Nagasaki and Aberdeen
- Nagasaki and Aberdeen have a historical connection through Thomas Blake Glover, who was born in Aberdeen and lived in Nagasaki, and who made huge contributions to the modernisation of Japan. Based on this connection, citizens' groups in Nagasaki and Aberdeen are carrying out dynamic cultural exchange.
- To encourage the further development of informal exchange between citizens of both cities, we confirm a Citizens' Friendship City Affiliation between Nagasaki and Aberdeen. This affiliation may be dissolved at the request of one or both parties.
- English and Japanese versions of this confirmation document have been produced. The Mayor of Nagasaki and the Lord Provost of Aberdeen will sign two copies of each version, and each city will retain one Japanese and one English copy.
